- 1. (a) What is the drinking water limit for TCE in i) the United States ii) Canada?
 - (b) What is the impact of TCE on human health?
 - (c) What are the issues that Canada is concerned with when they lower the MCL for a chemical species (it is more than medical)?
- 2. Beatrice Foods owned the tannery and 15 acres for only 5 months before contaminants were discovered in Wells G and H. Why would they be liable when in fact the contamination at the tannery and the 15 acres occurred well before their ownership?
- 3. The Plaintiffs asserted two theories of liability. What are these theories?
- 4. To prove their case, what did the Plaintiffs have to establish? What link of this causal chain was broken?
- 5. What was the role of groundwater measurement and modelling in the case? Why was this role important to the outcome of the case?
- 6. Develop a conceptual model for the site that you think might have been useful in proving that TCE and other dissolved solvents migrated from the 15 acres to wells G and H. The conceptual model should provide a <u>qualitative</u> description of the site, the boundary conditions and the parameters required for a comprehensive analysis.
